The tremendous results achieved by the Class of 2023 truly encapsulate the diversity that defines our school. We celebrate the individuality of each and every St Cath's girl.

The achievements of the Class of 2023 extend far beyond the academic realm, showcasing a profound love for learning and an ability to push boundaries to attain exceptional achievements.

The Class of 2023 also worked together to ensure the collective success of the entire year group. This collaborative effort resulted in a remarkable 91 students out of 114 achieved marks exceeding 90 in at least one subject, with an impressive 49.6% of students securing an ATAR above 90, surpassing the NSW state average of 71.05. These achievements are a testament to the entire cohort's diligence and commitment.

Our nine All Rounders: Jordan Alp, Alana Brennan, Elenor Craven, Solange Fadel, Sophie Kelley, Isla King, Sienna Price, Jasmine Ruffa and Sarah Sassine achieved a mark over 90 in at least 10 units of study. Rather than simply playing to their strengths, these students dedicated themselves across a wide range of subjects to achieve extraordinary results.

Our nine Top Achievers; Leila Carr, Evie Cook, Lies den Hollander, Samarah Issa, Isla King, Xinyan Lu, Jasmine Ruffa, Sarah Sassine and Yumeng (Amy) Xin, also deserve congratulations. Achieving recognition as a top student among a statewide cohort of 76,839 individuals is a remarkable accomplishment, and each should take great pride in their success.

We must also highlight the 18 students who received state-wide nominations for Drama, Design and Technology and Visual Arts. These nominations demonstrate the extremely high calibre of work produced by our students in their unique major projects. It is wonderful to see everything our girls achieve as they explore their passions.

Beyond the classroom, the Class of 2023 engaged in impactful service activities such as the 40 Hour Famine, Bread of Life, Red Shield Appeal, Pink Ribbon Day and Genes for Jeans. Additionally, they raised over \$5,000 for their chosen charity, Orygen, contributing to vital new mental health treatments for young people.

In sports, 50% of the cohort participated consistently in at least one cocurricular sport throughout five years of senior school. In 2023, students from the Class of 2023 excelled in various competitions, including the Henley Royal Regatta, Australian Rowing Championships, NSW All Schools Basketball Tri-Series, NSW CIS Swimming Championships, NSW CIS Golf Championship, Head of the River and Independent Schools Representative AFL.

We congratulate each student on their success this year - and can't wait to see everything the future holds for you all.

Q. What would you say went into achieving your results?

A. A lot of self-discipline to maintain my focus and determination over the two years. I did my HSC Mathematics in Year 11 as part of the accelerate program, which helped me get into the habit of working hard. My study just became a routine for me. I saw my hard work pay off for my mathematics mark, so I knew I just had to do the same in my other subjects. But, in saying that, I never envisioned I was gonna get the top mark. I didn't want that pressure.

Q. What has been your family's response to your result?

A. My mum cried and my dad was just in shock, just so happy for me. My parents have been the best throughout my HSC, helping me with anything that I needed.

They also saw their hard work pay off in that regard. If I didn't have such understanding parents, then I don't think I would have achieved this result.

Q. How important do you think it is for students to find a study-life balance?

A. You really need to find that balance. I danced at a local dance school doing five classes a week during Years 11 and 12. I found that dance was a great way to have a break from studying. It also kept me focused because I knew that if I had dance class, I needed to study before it and I'd feel more refreshed after it. You can't study all the time, you need to have a balance.

Q. What do you think you will remember most about your time at St Cath's?

A. The community, not just my friends, but also my teachers and the support they gave us all. If I needed something, I could go up to any of my teachers. By the end of Year 12, they felt more like mentors. I'll

also remember the connections between the other years. I was a Vice Captain for Patterson house and being a part of the leadership team helped build an even stronger sense of community.

Q. What is the most important lesson you have learnt at St Cath's?

A. I think the most important lesson I have learnt here at St Cath's is that hard work pays off, but it is important to maintain friendships to really succeed.

Q. What are your career aspirations and what steps are you taking toward these?

A. I'm going to Queens College at The University of Melbourne to study Commerce and then a Juris Doctor of Law. Unfortunately, they don't do double degrees. I'm not studying law to become a lawyer. At this stage, I would rather work in business and apply my legal understanding while working for a company. But I'm not sure what that will look like yet.

GETTING TO KNOW ISLA

Isla started St Cath's as a Year 5 student. She loved her time in Junior School, taking part in everything from Football to the Student Representative Council and Maths Olympiad. In Senior School, she continued to balance her studies with a wide range of cocurricular activities, including Basketball, da Vinci Decathlon and Netball. Q. What would you say went into achieving your results?

A. A lot of hard work went into achieving my results, not just from myself but also from my teachers. I put in a lot of time studying, but it was my teachers marking all that extra work that really helped me. You can't do all that on your own. I'm never going to get teachers like that ever again. They were so invested and involved. They cared so much about how I did, not for themselves, but just because they wanted me to be proud of myself. I wanted to do well for myself, but I also wanted to do well for my teachers because I knew how much work they put into it. They put so much work in so I wanted to match it.

Q. How important do you think it is for students to find a study-life balance?

A. I feel like that balance is quite hard to achieve. But I know I need it to be able to keep going. In Year 12, I studied a lot but I also made time for friends and family, even just going on a walk to do something for myself. Since I came to the school in Year 4, I've done so many cocurricular activities. I loved the sport at school. I made so many friends through sport, especially through Netball and Water Polo carrying through all my years. It really helped me maintain a balanced approach to study.

Q. What do you think you will remember most about your time at St Cath's?

A. I will definitely miss the teachers, especially our Headmistress, Mrs
Poole, who was my academic mentor.
That relationship is something I value so much. I am so grateful for her, she helped me so much. No matter what, I always had someone who I could go to and talk to who could actually help me. We didn't just have to talk about things going wrong, we could work towards a solution. It is a really unique program; most schools don't have anything like that at all.

Q. What are your career aspirations and what steps are you taking toward these?

A. I'm going to The University of Sydney and I'm studying double degree in Commerce and Law. I don't necessarily have a career goal. But I just feel like it's a very broad degree that will give me a lot of options. Sydney University doesn't do early entry, but I got into early entry at The University of Technology and also into The University of Melbourne with a scholarship. But as soon as the results came out and I found out I had the marks to get into The University of Sydney - that made the decision for me.

Q. What has been your family's response to your result?

A. They were very proud. But they were also a bit shocked because I never expected to do that well. They're very proud but also a bit shocked. 
empowered me to venture beyond my comfort zone and encouraged me to pursue my passions and interests. I learnt that I am capable of achieving incredible feats when I believe in myself.

WHAT THE FUTURE **HOLDS**

As our 2023 graduates prepare to embark on the next phase of their journeys, we know they are ready to face the challenges of our changing world.

As artificial intelligence, globalisation, and digital technology continue to shape the modern workforce, we know our students are preparing for careers that may not even exist yet. However, the Class of 2023, have been undeterred by this rapidly changing landscape. Instead, they have approached their futures with determination, focus and genuine excitement. These graduates are well-rounded and enthusiastic learners, eager to explore their passions and utilise their unique gifts to bring about positive change in the world. In the face of future uncertainties, our students exhibit adaptability and a readiness to take on challenges.

While some are opting for a gap year to broaden their horizons as global citizens, 87% of students have enrolled to attend various Australian universities, while two adventurous souls are spreading their wings for study overseas. Remarkably, 50% of our students who applied to university received an early offer. Of those, 71% accepted that offer.

The diversity of academic pursuits among the Class of 2023 is impressive, reflecting the diversity of the cohort. The field of Health, Medicine and Nursing has taken the lead this year claiming 16.4% of our students. Also prominent are Law and Commerce, both attracting approximately 12% of students. The Natural Sciences attracted 7.8% of students., while Arts claimed 9.4% and disciplines such as Psychology, Social Sciences, including Economics and Politics, Business Communications attracted between 6% to

7% of students, offering a diverse academic landscape. Notably, over 24% of our students are planning to undertake double degrees, reflecting a trend towards combining traditional fields like Medicine and Law with Commerce, Science, and Economics to expand future employment opportunities.

Additionally, 11 students from this cohort have been honoured with a scholarship, ranging from the prestigious Dalyell Scholars Program at The University of Sydney to Elite Athlete Scholarships. Noteworthy recognitions include the Chancellor's, National Merit and Alan D Latham Scholarships at The University of Melbourne, the Teacher Education Scholarship Program, the Vice-Chancellor's International Scholarship at The he University of Sydney and the Women in Engineering Scholarship at The University of Technology. The diverse range reflects the exceptional talent within our cohort, poised for success in various fields.

As our graduates venture into the next chapter of their lives, my hope for the St Catherine's Class of 2023 is that they embrace each new challenge with open minds and hearts. Armed with their unique skills and passions, these young women have the power to shape their own paths and contribute their talents to create a brighter future for all of us.
